

SJOGREN LARSSON SYNDROME (2 Case Reports) — D. N. Mulay, et al

WHAT IS YOUR DIAGNOSIS?

Twenty-six year old male patient complained of swelling on left side of the face for 6 years, loss of vision in left eye for 6 months, headache, vomitting and fits for 2 weeks. The only relevant past history was that of recurrent polyps in the nose which were excised once 15 years ago and later 7 years ago.

Examination showed a large swelling involving the left cheek, forehead and orbit. The swelling varied in consistency being firm, soft and cystic. There were several small superficial ulcers discharging purulent material. Neck rigidity was present and Kernig's sign was positive.

Differential diagnosis:

- 1. Aspergillosis
- 2. Rhinosporidiosis
- Tuberculous ulcer with Tuberculosis meningitis
