## FROM OUR BOOKSHELF

HINTS ON DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT OF LEPROSY: By Dr. R. V. Wardekar, M. D., Director, Gandhi Memorial Leprosy, Wardha, Pp. 34, Figs. 15; Price: Re. 1.00 (without postage); 1.50 (with postage).

This is a small book of great value to all those who would care to read it; because it is written by a man who has dedicated his whole life in the crusade against this much maligned malady of leprosy. Dr. Wardekar is a pathologist by training. He let go all the prospects of a lucrative career in a city like Bombay and instead threw himself heart and soul, in the campaign against leprosy, out of sheer humane and fellow feeling for the millions of sufferers of this so called fell disease.

His meticulous study of the problem is revealed in the book. It is primarily intended for general medical practitioners who shouldbe tter remember facts about leprosy and forget the fictions. He has laboured hard to remove all the prejudices. He has convincingly made a case for treatment of leprosy in dispensaries and in outpatient departments. In short patients suffering from leprosy should be handled and managed in the same way as others suffering from any other inection. He appeals to medical as well as nonmedical people to adopt a humane and sympathetic attitude towards sufferers of the disease. In a way this will help to control the disease.

Though the book is primarily intended for general practitioners, it is a must for all those who want to understand the evolution of the disease and its classification based thereon. It is thus instructive to undergraduates and postgraduates as well. The book is strongly recommended.—T. K. M.
